

ABOUT ONA DRIVING INNOVATION IN DIGITAL JOURNALISM

The Online News Association (ONA) convenes and equips digital innovators and newsroom leaders with the resources they need to drive a sustainable journalism industry. Our programs advance newsrooms' understanding of how digital spaces have changed access to information, deliver practical training and connect changemakers within the industry to each other.

ONA has been guiding digital transitions since its founding in 1999. Our early members were among the few in their organizations who saw the internet's potential to strengthen journalism, at a time when many viewed online news as less credible than print or broadcast. ONA has led the industry to explore emerging opportunities and served as a resources hub for numerous journalists through multiple cycles of significant transformation. These disruptions have included the decline of legacy print outlets, the rise and fall of social media platforms and in more recent years, the emergence of news influencers, a shift to independent creator journalism and the rapid mainstreaming of generative artificial intelligence.

In 2024, as we marked ONA's 25th anniversary, our programming centered a key lesson from this experience: Journalism must actively define and shape technology's role in our field rather than the other way around. From supporting ethical and effective AI implementation to guiding journalists through the implications on their careers, our work created tangible, positive change for individual journalists, their organizations and the communities they serve.

AI IN JOURNALISM INITIATIVE

As artificial intelligence reshapes how our society accesses and understands news and information, ONA has been an essential, trusted resource for journalists and newsroom leaders to adapt and embrace the opportunities. The Al in Journalism Initiative draws on ONA's 25 years of experience supporting the journalism industry to reflect the best practices necessary to create positive change:

- Broad understanding and buy-in at all levels and functions, rather than a single expert or team tasked with "figuring out" emerging technology within an organization
- Clear benchmarks for excellence, showcasing ethical and effective uses for AI through case studies, templates and guides to best practices
- Room to experiment, in low-risk spaces where members can learn together and bridge training with implementation.

In 2024, the initiative reached **2,792 individual participants** representing **over 1,500 organizations** across our programming.

Driving Al literacy across newsrooms, functions and the industry

Core to our strategy with the AI in Journalism Initiative is advancing AI literacy throughout the news industry, in a variety of roles and levels. ONA developed a robust slate of practical training sessions to increase fluency in generative AI technology. Since February 2024, we've hosted **39 practical training sessions** online and in person, reaching more than **1,700 individuals**.

The curriculum takes a clear-eyed view of the ethical and trust issues while also focusing on ways the technology can be used in a practical sense. We've also led three pilot in-person practical training workshops on AI tools and how they work—two at ONA24 in Atlanta in September and one in August in Chicago. Throughout our programming, we encouraged participants to take the recordings, exercises and resources from the sessions back to their organizations and communities.

Advancing best practices in AI across the industry

We've taken a unique approach to serve as a hub for the industry's foremost thinking around AI through community building, partnerships, recognition and storytelling.

COMMUNITY OF PRACTICE

The Al Innovator Collaborative brings together journalists actively experimenting with Al to learn from one another. In 2024, over 280 ONA members joined monthly gatherings to discuss topics such as business and operational uses, trust and transparency, evaluating tools and career development. The group is steadily growing, while re-engaging a consistent community with each meeting.

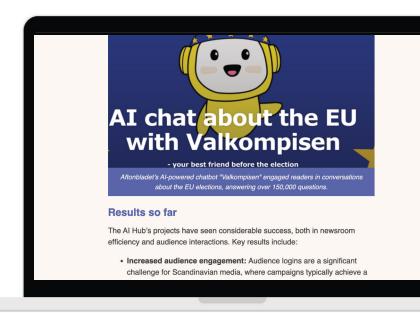
INSIGHTS FOR MANAGERS AND EXECUTIVES

Driving the conversation around Al's impact on newsrooms, ONA led seven thought leadership sessions that considered legal and copyright issues, visual journalism, trust, ethics, research, digital provenance and newsroom readiness. In September, we gathered 120 newsroom leaders for our first **Al Executive Summit**, held during the ONA annual conference, to discuss strategies for operationalizing Al. The summit covered partnerships and business strategies, a research overview on Al's impact on the news industry and blueprints to help leaders identify critical job roles, training needs and practical steps for Al integration.

CASE STUDIES FROM THE NEWSROOM

In collaboration with **Nikita Roy**, ICFJ Fellow, Al futurist and host of Newsroom Robots, we published <u>10 case studies</u> highlighting specific ways news organizations are building and using Al tools. In all, **2,026 people** subscribed to the **Al in the Newsroom** email series, with an average open rate of 57%, well above Mailchimp's media and publishing industry benchmark of 34%. To complement the written series, we hosted live sessions with several of the newsrooms to share more about what they built and how, as well as discuss questions from the community. **Over 500 people** attended at least one session in the case study event series.

AUDIENCE TRUST AND TRANSPARENCY

ONA partnered with **Trusting News** to develop best practices around transparency and communication on AI use with audiences. Trusting News had a strong framework for communicating with audiences about the work journalists do, but they needed to test how this framework applied to AI use and disclosure.

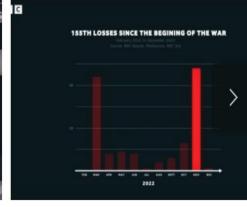
We recruited from ONA's community to build a cohort of 10 newsrooms that worked with the experts at Trusting News to test audience communication strategies on Al use. The participating newsrooms collected more than 6,000 audience survey responses measuring attitudes towards different tested messaging around Al use. With the results, Trusting News developed a toolkit of best practices and resources for newsrooms to use in conversation with their communities about Al use. ONA has hosted three sessions with Trusting News so far, online and in person, to share the findings and resources across the community.

RECOGNIZING AI INNOVATION

The 2024 Online Journalism Awards introduced a new category to recognize Excellence in Al Innovation. The award honors an individual or organization that has implemented AI tools to improve newsroom productivity, accessibility, news gathering and/or audience engagement. Judges selected one winner and two finalists projects from 19 entries. The winning entry from the BBC used Al in an open-source investigation of a Russian military unit deployed in Ukraine. The finalists were from THE CITY, a project that used ChatGPT to analyze their own coverage of New York City's neighborhoods to hold themselves accountable to their reporting mission for all New Yorkers, and YESEO, a Slack app created by Reynolds Journalism Institute fellow Ryan Restivo to help newsrooms with headline writing.







BUILDING THE FIELD WITH PARTNERSHIPS AND COALITIONS

Programming for the AI in Journalism Initiative highlighted and engaged diverse collaborators throughout the year. They were experts from small local newsrooms, large legacy media institutions, technology companies, foundations, media associations, universities and other organizations looking to amplify digital innovation. Collaborators have included Journalists' Toolbox, Poynter Institute, The Globe and Mail, National Press Photographers Association, Newsroom Robots, The New York Times, Poynter Institute, TulipAI, Reddit, Hacks/Hackers American Journalism Project, Spotlight PA, Hearken and others.

Driving experimentation

ONA's AI programming inspired and informed interesting experiments in newsrooms of all sizes. Some of our favorite projects include a personalized media sales kit to show clients why their advertising reach is unique; using AI as a research assistant ahead of interviews; answering questions about voting and elections; and supporting video creation to expand local news coverage.

Throughout 2024, ONA hosted a series of highly interactive 45-minute sessions called **Mini Labs** designed to guide attendees in experimenting with Al tools. Mini Labs focused on image generation, research, pitch development, prompt writing, audio and more. For each session, a facilitator designed a brief exercise for attendees to get hands-on experience and talk with the group about the results. **Nearly 1,000 individuals** attended at least one Mini Lab session.

A strategy leader at a large news organization shared: "It reminds me of the early days of digital transformation: Many of us don't quite know how we should prioritize, what are the best use cases, where to spend our time and where it isn't worth it. Hearing people who had been experimenting already share their lessons saved us a lot of time and helped us prioritize. It's as beneficial to hear about failures as successes."

ANNUAL CONFERENCE

The 2024 Online News Association Conference (ONA24) gathered **over 1,500 leaders in journalism and technology** in Atlanta from Sept. 18-21. Attendees represented an array of roles and expertise, including newsroom roles at organizations ranging from digital websites to local television stations, news product specialists, executive management, educators, entrepreneurs and experts working in journalism support organizations (e.g. foundations, associations, research institutes).

ONA24 programming delivered fresh insights on journalism leadership and emerging technologies, including AI. This year's schedule emphasized practical training, workshops diving into topics that will impact every role in journalism in the next few years and many opportunities to build meaningful connections in person.

Learning sessions

ONA24 offered 51 standard learning sessions that were largely shaped by pitches from community members. Across all sessions, **52% of ONA24 speakers identify as people of color,** well above the 40% marker at ONA23 and 38% at ONA22.

In-depth workshops

We bookended the four-day schedule with longer, focused workshops, including the Al Executive Summit, designed to guide leaders through operationalizing Al in newsrooms; a creator journalism workshop, to support experienced journalists with an action plan for going solo; a four-part training for first-time managers; and a full-day series on journalists' safety, with comprehensive advice from securing communications to building peer support. ONA convened nearly a dozen industry organizations to serve as hosts and collaborate on programming for many of these workshops.





Networking Meetups

New this year, we dedicated significant blocks of time on Thursday and Friday for casual networking meetups to connect attendees with similar work roles and interests, and invited community members to pitch topics as part of the conference Suggestion Box process. In all, we organized 22 meetups, including for climate journalists, local news researchers, founders and entrepreneurs, project managers, newsletter professionals and journalists in the U.S. South.







Startup Alley

The Startup Alley within the ONA24 Midway is a unique opportunity for attendees to discover some of the most exciting innovations in products and services for journalism. Eight startups were selected to showcase their solutions and connect directly with ONA community members: elvex, Everlit, Featured.com, GlueLetter, The Hyperlocal News Network, InPress and The Institute for Independent Journalists.

WOMEN IN LEADERSHIP

Women's Leadership Accelerator

The 2024 Women's Leadership Accelerator selected 26 journalism changemakers for an intensive leadership training and coaching program. The cohort includes women who have demonstrated a deep understanding of the digital journalism landscape and are actively creating positive change within their organizations and/or the industry at large. Members represent a range of journalism expertise and serve audiences from Omaha, Nebraska, to Beirut, Lebanon and the majority of them identify as women of color.

In addition to training on leadership styles and organizational change, personalized one-on-one coaching sessions, and a collaborative in-person workshop, cohort members also benefit from both organized and informal opportunities to connect with the accelerator's powerful community of alums, speakers and mentors. This year's program engaged over 20 speakers and coaches with wide-ranging expertise across digital media, including **Vera Bergengruen**, National Security Reporter at The Wall Street Journal; **Ashley Alvarado**, President & CEO at Texas Public Radio; **Kaitlyn Jakola**, Editorial Director of Strategy and Operations at the Chicago Sun-Times; **Keiko Morris**, Director of Journalism Recruiting at The New York Times; and **Kendall Trammell**, Director of Distribution & Weekend Programming at CNN.

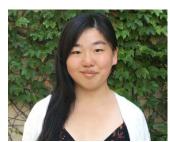


















ONLINE JOURNALISM AWARDS

The Online Journalism Awards (OJAs) have set the standards for excellence and innovation in digital journalism for 25 years. The 2024 awards received **1,280 entries** and celebrated standout projects in climate reporting, community engagement, visual storytelling, partnerships and collaborations, Al innovation (new this year) and 18 other categories.

Winners in six of the categories received a total of \$57,000 in prize money, thanks to generous support from award sponsors The University of Florida College of Journalism and Communications, 3M, the University of Oregon School of Journalism and Communication's Agora Journalism Center, McKinsey Publishing, John S. and James L. Knight Foundation and SmartNews.

Community members gathered for a celebratory luncheon and ceremony, hosted by CNN anchor and correspondent **Amara Walker**, on Friday, Sept. 20, in Atlanta. The ceremony included special honors for the 2024 recipients of the ONA Community Award, the Impact Award and the James Foley Award for Conflict Reporting. These awards look beyond individual journalism projects to recognize individuals or small groups who have contributed long-lasting impact to the industry and serve as exceptional examples and inspiration for their peers.

Practical guidance for aspiring creator journalists

Recognizing the valuable role solo practitioners play in the media ecosystem, ONA hosted a deep-dive workshop in Atlanta for experienced, mid-career journalists considering striking out on their own on Substack, YouTube or other online platforms. The Going Solo: Creator Journalism Workshop guided attendees towards a clear action plan to become independent creators with insights from four experts who have been there:

Ryan Kellett, 2025 Nieman-Berkman Fellow for Journalism Innovation at Harvard University, who previously led audience engagement for Axios and The Washington Post

Liz Kelly Nelson, who led audio as well as revenue and operations strategies at Vox before transitioning to consulting as a Journalism Audience, Business and Content Strategist and launching the Project C, a newsletter about and for creator journalists

Caitlin Dewey, freelance journalist and writer of the newsletter Links I would GChat You If We Were Friends, who worked over a decade as a reporter for The Buffalo News and The Washington Post

Blair Hickman, former content and audience engagement leader for newsrooms like Vox, The Marshall Project and ProPublica, and now offering consulting and strategic advisory services through Ida Media.

Building on this experience, our facilitators launched an expanded, six-week version tailored to journalists looking to launch a newsletter business. The online workshop includes weekly 90-minute sessions that cover areas such as audience building, revenue streams and ethics.

Career advice sessions

Professional development opportunities during ONA's annual conference included small-group, career advice sessions aimed at early- and midcareer professionals. In all, 17 industry leaders volunteered their time to meet with 99 attendees.

ONA Career Center

Newsroom employers, fellowship directors and graduate school programs count on ONA's <u>Career</u> <u>Center</u> throughout the year to discover journalism talent and build standout teams. Frequent recruiters this year included The Seattle Times, Arizona State University, Oregon Public Broadcasting, States Newsroom and ProPublica.
